But difficult to fit into a short text and would not alter main conclusion.



Recurring connection between right and TAN

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
- Right-wing on the socio-cultural dimension (Rydgren).
- A 'winning formula' consisting of economic liberalism, socio-cultural authoritarianism and opposition to immigration and multiculturalism to create cross-class alliance of small business owners, labor market inactives and blue-collar workers (Kitschelt).
- "Notions such as authority, hierarchy, order, duty, tradition, reaction and nationalism are generally seen as having a right-wing character" (Heywood).

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How to reconcile?

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The two-dimensional view is still attractive

- They are not right-wing.
- But because right-wing parties are more nationalist (for example) they tend to enter right-wing coalitions.

Arguments in favour of a one-dimensional view

- The meaning of left and right has changed over time, but it tends to refer to the main policy dimension, be it revolution—monarchy or issues of economic redistribution?
- We have always known which the radical right parties are, but we are still disputing what they are the term must capture something.
- Radical right parties exclusively rule with right-wing parties. This is not implied by the two-dimensional view?
- Issues or dimensions that are disconnected from the left-right scale tends to eventually be absorbed by the latter.

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
